

We're proud of our progress and grateful for the collaboration across Playgroup WA, building a strong foundation for sustainable growth and future success.





Impact of Playgroups

Playgroups are a form of Early Childhood Education and Care (ECEC) where young children aged 0–5 and their parents/carers come together for play and social activities. Families meet in a supportive environment to socialise, play and learn together. Many playgroups are run by local parent volunteers, making them cost-effective, building parent and community capacity while supporting children's development through play.

Recent research* findings:



more likely to be developmentally on track when attending times playgroup



more likely to be developmentally on track when attending both times playgroup and preschool



reduced risk of being developmentally vulnerable in two or more domains when attending playgroup

Playgroups benefit both children and parents, providing opportunities to connect, make friends, and play in a supportive community setting. Their informal environment allows parents and caregivers to be actively involved in their child's development, which, alongside formal preschool, maximises early childhood benefits. Families also gain access to Playgroup WA's expertise, evidence-based resources, and support through Playgroup WA staff, collaborations and partnerships.

Community Playgroups







Playgroup Development Officers play a vital role in supporting volunteers to establish and sustain parent-led, community playgroups across WA. They work directly with playgroup leaders and committees, providing guidance, resources, and practical advice to ensure playgroups run effectively and remain welcoming and sustainable. Beyond supporting individual playgroups, Playgroup Development Officers actively promote playgroup participation at a broader community level. They attend Child Health Nurse talks, Early Years Network meetings, community events, and forums with service providers and stakeholders to raise awareness of playgroups. Through this work, they advocate for the vital role of play in early childhood development, while also highlighting how parent-led playgroups foster community connections and support parental wellbeing.

PLAYGROUP DEVELOPMENT OFFICERS:

- Delivered 216 Child Health Nurse presentations to 1809 new parents.
- Recorded over 1025 instances of committee support, providing guidance on venues, grants, ABN and ACNC requirements, playgroup management, handovers, promotion, and membership enquiries, among other topics.
- * Attended 54 Early Years Network
- * Attended 15 meetings related to advocacy for community playgroups with Local Governments.

First 1000 Days at Playgroup

First 1000 Days groups across Western Australia















First 1000 Days playgroup sessions are supported by Playgroup Development Officers and give new parents and their babies a gentle introduction to playgroup while offering connection, support and guidance during this vital time for early child development. Partnerships with other organisations added further value by providing new parents with upskilling opportunities and capacity building.

The initiative has reduced social isolation and strengthened community connections, yet demand continues to outpace capacity. High delivery levels in 2024 required scaling back in 2025 to protect other core services. Despite these challenges, the program's impact has been significant. A Child Health Nurse noted that new parent groups that are supported to join playgroup are more likely to remain connected long-term. This demonstrates the program's critical role in fostering sustained parental connections and building peer support networks that strengthen families and communities well beyond the early months.





Enhanced Transition to School Project

The Enhanced Transition to School project is a partnership between Playgroup WA, the WA Department of Education, Catholic Education WA, and the Association of Independent Schools WA. It is funded by the Australian Government through the Preschool Reform Agreement. This project is currently funded until 31 December 2025.

The Enhanced Transition to School (ETTS) project helps children and families prepare for school and lifelona learning by creating strong connections between families and schools. This is done by establishing parent-run playgroups on or near school grounds. These playgroups help local families connect and support their children's development at home and in the community and makes it easier for children to move into school life.

Playgroup WA ETTS Development Officers work closely with schools and local families to enable access to free venues, start-up kits, and early support to help parents run their own playgroups. This support helps families build confidence, capacity and self-efficacy.

These playgroups have made a big difference, especially in isolated areas where there are few childcare or social options. They give families a place to connect, learn, and grow together, making the transition to school much smoother for children.

"My little boy who is shy by nature has gone from not leaving my side, to enthusiastically running ahead to the playgroup room to see his friends and the other parents who he adores. It has been such an important step for him in gaining confidence in himself as well as familiarising him with the environment where he will attend school."

Intergenerational Activities, Service

The Intergenerational Activities Service, funded by the WA Department for Communities, continues to foster meaningful connections between seniors and families with young children through playgroups and events. These initiatives promote mutual understanding, respect, and community cohesion across generations.

INTERGENERATIONAL PLAYGROUPS

Intergenerational playgroups are typically small and intimate, jointly managed by families and senior service staff, creating spaces for authentic relationships. Families value the opportunity for children and carers to engage with seniors in the community, forming lasting intergenerational bonds.

Playgroup WA also supported the establishment of 10 new metropolitan intergenerational playgroups, providing hands-on assistance to five, including those at Aegis Shorehaven in Alkimos, RAAFA Gordon Lodge in Bull Creek, St. Jude's Hostel in Guildford, and Opal Applecross Shore Care.

Supporting Aboriginal Communities


In 2024-2025, with funding from the National Indigenous Australians Agency (NIAA), Playgroup WA ran supported playgroups in regional Western Australia for local First Nations families. Playgroups were operational on a weekly basis throughout the school terms in Laverton, Pingelly, Coolgardie, and Quairading, and fortnightly in Menzies during the reporting period of January to June 2025. Strong attendance highlighted ongoing demand and high community engagement in these regional

This work reflects the vital importance of the early years and aligns with the National Agreement on Closing the Gap, particularly Targets 3 and 4. These targets focus on improving access to quality, culturally safe early childhood education and ensuring children thrive in their early development.

Multicultural **Playgroups**

Playgroup WA receives funding from the Swan Communities for Children Midland for the facilitation of two multicultural playgroups located at Malvern Springs Community Centre in Ellenbrook and at Brabham Pavilion in Brabham. These playgroups continue to provide opportunities for parents to interact with their children through play. The funding for these valuable playgroups is secured until July 2026.

PlayConnect+ is funded by the Australian Government Department of Social Services through a national consortium contract managed by Autism Queensland. Through this contract, Playgroup WA manages the PlayConnect+ program for Western Australia.

Playgroup WA facilitated 9 playgroups that supported children with disability and developmental delay and their families. The families at these playgroups meet once per week for a two-hour playgroup session, facilitated by two Playgroup WA professionals.

Inclusion Project

Playgroup WA, in collaboration with Kiind, is working to support our community playgroups to become more inclusive and accessible for all children - particularly those with disability and/or developmental delay. Every child deserves the opportunity to play, connect, and thrive alongside their peers, and this project is focused on building the capacity of community playgroups to support diverse needs and to foster welcoming environments where all children and families feel they belong.



A disability inclusion survey was sent to all our members and wider networks to gain feedback and insight from families as to what they feel will support playgroups to be more inclusive for children, parents and carers with disability and/or developmental delay, and any barriers or challenges they have faced in accessing playgroup, from an inclusivity perspective.

The survey received 371 responses. The results identified that families would like to see:

- * opportunities for social interaction, both for the child and the parents/carers
- * a safe and inclusive environment
- * a sensory-friendly environment.

We held several focus groups across the Perth metropolitan area and regional WA.

The outcome of the project is to have inclusion resources packs and online training modules available for playgroups and families, which will be available on our website.

Projects

CHILD SAFETY

Playgroup WA places child safety at the heart of everything we do. Throughout the year, staff and Board members undertook training in child protection and protective behaviours, ensuring they are equipped with the knowledge and skills to create safe, supportive environments for children and families. This commitment strengthens our organisation's culture of safety and reinforces our role as a trusted peak body for playgroups across Western Australia.

To maintain strong governance and continuous improvement in this area, our Child Safe Committee meets regularly to review policies, monitor emerging themes, and guide best practices. This ongoing oversight ensures that child safety remains embedded in all aspects of Playgroup WA's operations and service delivery, demonstrating our proactive approach to safeguarding children and supporting families statewide.



RESEARCH

Playgroup WA recognises the importance of contributing to research and policy discussions to strengthen outcomes for children and families. By engaging with research initiatives, we ensure the voices of families and playgroups are represented, while also accessing the latest evidence to inform our programs and resources. We are actively involved in a range of committees and steering groups, including the WA Peaks Forum, Child and Policy Advisor Council, Play Connect+ Steering Committee, The Kids Scientific Committee, Flourishing Child Steering Committee, and the Connecting Early Years Reference Group. These forums provide opportunities to collaborate with sector leaders, share insights from playgroups, and influence strategies that shape the important early years across Western Australia.



CO-DESIGN OF PLAYFUL HEALTH ARTS

This year, Playgroup WA continued to work with Edith Cown University on a project titled Co-design of Playful Health Arts, which involved consulting with several playgroups and Playgroup WA's Playgroup Development Officers, as well as artists and education professionals, on the development of Arts play-based experiences that deliver key health messages to children and families at playgroups in Western Australia. This is being funded by a Healthway grant. In the upcoming financial year, the project will be launched, with videos and activity cards available on the Playgroup WA website for playgroups and families to use at playgroupwa.com.au/together-at-playgroup

YOUNG CHILDREN IN DIGITAL SOCIETY

In November 2024, the Young Children in Digital Society website was launched at a conference at the Australian Catholic University, Melbourne. Attended by Playgroup WA's CEO and Marketing Manager, this was the result of a collaborative national research project involving several universities and organisations, funded by the Australian Research Council. For the Western Australian part of this, Playgroup WA partnered with Curtin University, ABC Kids and Raising Children Network, with a focus on finding ways parents can use technology to support their child being physically active and to support their child to transition smoothly from using a screen to the next activity. More broadly, this project was focused on four areas of technology use outlined in the Early Childhood Australia (ECA) Statement on Young Children and Digital Technologies. The four areas are Relationships, Health and Wellbeing, Citizenship, and Play and Pedagogy. Children, families and educators from across Australia trialed and adapted different practices for engaging with technologies. The identified practices have been developed into ideas that can be shared and used by other children and families. These are available on the website: youngchildrendigitalsociety.com.au

Promotion, Engagement & Events

In 2024-2025, Playgroup WA's marketing team hosted five community events, supported playgroups to host their own events, and managed the production and roll out of videos for a digital advertising campaign focused on raising awareness of playgroup and its benefits. In addition to the digital campaign, Playgroup WA aimed to raise awareness of playgroup with an exhibition space at the PBC Baby Expo and included flyer inserts in the Bounty Bag for New Parents. Through website, social media and newsletters, Playgroup WA provided information, giveaways, member discounts, play activities, child development research opportunities, as well as messages from partners and advertisers.

We also launched the inaugural Celebrate Play Day, marking the UN International Day of Play, with interactive play stations promoting the benefits of play.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Playgroup WA Inc (the entity), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025, the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and the directors' declaration.
